Holy Communion

On October 31, 1517, Martin Luther nailed the 95 Theses to the church door in Wittenberg, Germany, setting into motion the Protestant Reformation. For many years, churches that bear his name have celebrated the nearest Sunday as Reformation Sunday. The liturgical color is red to signify the presence of the Holy Spirit, the renewing presence of God. In the last century, the Holy Spirit began to connect churches in an ecumenical movement that has brought a unity unimagined just a few generations ago. Lutherans and Roman Catholics have agreed on the doctrine of justification by grace through faith. By continuing to use the appointed readings for the 23rd Sunday after Pentecost we read the same Scripture as Roman Catholics, Presbyterians, United Methodists, Episcopalians, the United Church of Christ, and others that use the lectionary.

In that Spirit, we continue to use green for the Time after Pentecost. It's appropriate that we add a new tablecloth, painted on silk by Kristen Gilje, when the earth bursts into summer bloom, to signify that the church is, indeed, growing, changing, and flowering in beautiful ways for a new generation of faithful people. Of course, every year, we have the option to choose texts for either occasion, allowing us to use green or red. For today's liturgy, themes of Word, reformation, grace, freedom, and unconditional love are woven together with the Bartimaeus story. Perhaps all of us are having our eyes opened in new ways.


After the Gospel is announced, the assembly responds: Glory to you, O Lord.

⁴⁶ As [Jesus] and his disciples and a large crowd were leaving Jericho, Bartimaeus son of Timaeus, a blind beggar, was sitting by the roadside. ⁴⁷ When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout out and say, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!" ⁴⁸ Many sternly ordered him to be quiet, but he cried out even more loudly, "Son of David, have mercy on me!" ⁴⁹ Jesus stood still and said, "Call him here." And they called the blind man, saying to him, "Take heart; get up, he is calling you." ⁵⁰ So throwing off his cloak, he sprang up and came to Jesus. ⁵¹ Then Jesus said to him, "What do you want me to do for you?" The blind man said to him, "My teacher, let me see again." ⁵² Jesus said to him, "Go; your faith has made you well." Immediately he regained his sight and followed him on the way.

After the Gospel has been read, the assembly responds: Praise to you, O Christ.

Sermon

Bartimaeus comes to Jesus with faith, asking that he might see again. Recognizing Jesus' identity, Bartimaeus is the first person to call him "Son of David" in the Gospel of Mark.


The Lord be with you. And also with you.

now and forever. Amen.


+Invitation to Communion


